Fiscal Year 2023 Tax Amnesty Program conclusion

In accordance with R.I.G.L. §44-5-8.6 and local ordinances 16-56 and 16-57, the City has completed its 2023 fiscal year Tax Amnesty period. The waiver period ran for 60 days from August 15, 2023, through October 16, 2023. The City Assessor worked with the Tax Collector's office to administer the program. Below is a chart illustrating the outcome of the program. The program collected \$468,248 in total, of this approximately \$82,000 collected is for the 2023 tax roll, the remaining sum is all delinquent past years. Interest was only waived on 2022 and prior bills, with a limit of \$10,000 for real estate bills only. There were no taxpayers who were denied the advantage of the program.

CHAPTER 805

AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 2 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF EAST PROVIDENCE, RHODE ISLAND, 1998, AS AMENDED, ENTITLED "ADMINISTRATION"

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EAST PROVIDENCE HEREBY ORDAINS:

SECTIONI. Article VI entitled "Municipal Court" of Chapter 2 entitled "Administration" of the Revised Ordinances of the City of East Providence, Rhode Island, 1998, is amended by adding thereto the following:

Sec. 2-283. Building Code Violation Fines, Zoning Code Violation Fines, Minimum Housing Code Violation Fines Judgments.

- a) There is hereby created a reserve fund account whereby all revenues generated by fines Municipal Court Judgments resulting from Building Code Violations, Zoning Code Violations, and/or Minimum Housing Code Violations shall be deposited. Such funds shall only be used in the manner prescribed as follows:
 - 1. Low-income homeowner loans. The Director of Finance shall create a loan program for the benefit of persons appearing before municipal court related to Building Code Violations, Zoning Code Violations, and/or Minimum Housing Code Violations. Such program will require the following:
 - i. The applicant must be before the Municipal Court for Building Code Violations, Zoning Code Violations, and/or Minimum Housing Code Violations; and
 - ii. The applicant must be an individual person, and not a corporation of any form; and
 - iii. The property to benefit must be owned by an individual person, and not a corporation of any form; and
 - iv. The property to benefit must be the primary residence of the owner; and
 - v. The property owner must qualify for the loan by way of a means test whereby applicants shall only qualify if they fall below income thresholds to be annually established by the Director of Finance; and
 - vi. The loan shall be a low interest loan; and
 - vii. The loan shall be secured by a lien against the property; and
 - viii. The loan may only be used to cure any and all Building Code Violations, Zoning Code Violations, and/or Minimum Housing Code Violations; and
 - ix. The loan must effectively cure all Building Code Violations, Zoning Code Violations, and Minimum Housing Code Violations at the property.
 - 2. Capital Improvements Budget. The Director of Finance City Council may, annually

at the time of budget, take funds from this reserve fund and transfer them to the Capital Budget whenever such funds are not needed to support the Low income homeowner loan program.

SECTION II. This ordinance shall take effect upon its second passage and all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Dear Councilor Rego: / MMh

As a follow-up to our telephone conversation yesterday, I write to voice my strong concerns regarding what has been reported as the City of East Providence's intention partner with State Housing officials to open a homeless shelter in former retail property on the East Providence side of the Narragansett Park Plaza in the Ward your represent, and on the immediate boundary with the City of Pawtucket and, specifically, the Ward I represent.

Let me first say that I, my Council colleagues, and each of the residents I represent are empathetic to the statewide homelessness/housing crises. Indeed, the City of Pawtucket has long been the tip of the spear on many such issues; we have forever hosted and supported vital soup kitchen facilities in the city, established a vital homeless warming center in the city's Woodlawn area last year, and cooperated with state officials to house a family homeless shelter in the former Memorial Hospital (also in my Ward).

That sense of empathy and commitment to our fellow man notwithstanding, I (and my constituents) have myriad concerns with this proposal. Here are just a couple:

- 1. It's my understanding that this proposal was developed and agreed to with nary a moment's dialogue with you and your colleagues or with your constituents. I don't know that for certain, but what I do know with certainty is that Pawtucket city officials were not consulted about such an important issue just a few feet across the city boundary. This lack of neighborly outreach is all the more disappointing in light of the fact that the City Councils in each city and the Planning Departments in each city had worked collaboratively over the last couple years to piece together a development plan for the revitalization of that area that was supposed to transform that that degrading commercial plaza straddling both cities into a robust mixed-use center akin to uber-successful Garden City Shopping Center in Cranston. Along that line of thinking and in the spirit of cooperation, I'd kindly ask that your council confer with your Planning Department to determine if this proposal conforms with the provisions of those combined ordinance/zoning/planning amendments. Maybe it does, maybe it doesn't, but I have to ask since we had no advance outreach.
- 2. The lack information and cooperation is nothing new for Pawtucket (and, to be honest, the whole of the state's urban core) on such matters because of the unending insistence of State housing officials to try to solve a <u>state-wide</u> issue affecting 39 municipalities in two or three or four urban communities. Think about that irony: they are forever lauding themselves for their sensitivity toward the homeless community, while continually displaying complete insensitivity toward the neighborhoods upon which they are foisting there "fixes," most of which are swing-and-miss approaches that actually negatively impact the vulnerable homeless community.

 Essentially, the State's inability (reluctance?) to take a comprehensive holistic approach to a statewide problem is creating these "emergency" situations every year as we head into winter. Homeless shelters are supposed to be located in a manner to give clients more readily accessible services. Yet, no such readily accessible services exist near the Narragansett Plaza.
- 3. Finally, in our brief conversation yesterday, you most appropriately raised the issue of increased public safety responsibilities and the concomitant costs. It is unquestionable that the siting of this proposed facility a few yards from the Pawtucket line where no essential services exist will result in increased public safety responses by both cities' police and fire departments, straining manpower and budgets, and adding a level of uneasiness for residents in your ward and mine.

Again, I appreciate you taking my call yesterday and appreciate as well your own concerns relative to this matter as it affects you council district. I honestly don't mean to drop this issue at your feet, but we've known each other long enough that I trust you can adequately relay my frustration (and I dare say your own) to your colleagues and the EP administration. Please don't hesitate to reach out if you'd like to discuss further, or if you have a response from your Planning Department.

SECTION I. The City Council hereby repeals ordinance Chapter 897 adopted on August 29, 2023 which appropriated up to \$550,000 from Federal ARPA funds to replace the walking track at Pierce Field Football Stadium.

SECTION II. The City has received a Municipal Infrastructure Grant (MIG) in the amount of \$200,000 through the Rhode Island Infrastructure Bank toward the construction of public parking lots at Potter Street and Warren Avenue and Burgess Street and Warren Avenue.

SECTION III. The City Council hereby reallocates and reappropriates \$447,870 to be funded from Federal ARPA funds for the Potter Street and Burgess Street Parking Lots. These parking lots will aide and assist the growing businesses and surrounding community.

SECTION IV. The remaining balance of \$102,130 of ARPA funds will be used toward the repairs to the walking track at Pierce Field Football Stadium.

A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY ON THE METACOMET SITE AT 500 VETERANS MEMORIAL PARKWAY

WHEREAS, the property at 500 Veterans Memorial Parkway, the site of the former Metacomet Golf Club, has been an iconic open space in the City of East Providence for over 100 years; and

WHEREAS, prior to its use as a golf course, the site was utilized as farmland for a generation or more; and

WHEREAS, prior to its use as farmland, there is a reasonable possibility that the Native American village at nearby Jones Pond extended into the Metacomet site; and

WHEREAS, a 1930 partial excavation of the Jones Pond site revealed a burial; and

WHEREAS, Marshall Properties, also known as Metacomet Properties, as part of its development of the site has already conducted extensive earthwork construction on the 9-hole deed-restricted portion of the site, as well as limited excavation on the developable portion of the site, without regulatory supervision; and

WHEREAS, Rhode Island General Laws (§23-18 et seq) prohibits "ground disturbance" within 25 feet of a burial; and

WHEREAS, Rhode Island State law authorizes the Rhode Island Historical Preservation & Heritage Commission (RIHPHC) as regulator and protector of historic cemeteries in Rhode Island; and

WHEREAS, RIHPHC's" Registration and Protection of Historic Cemeteries" handbook published in 2012 defines a historic or historical cemetery as "any tract of land which has been for more than one hundred (100) years used as a burial place for human remains... including, but not limited to, ancient burial places known or suspected to contain the remains of one or more Native Americans;" and

WHEREAS, RIHPHC's regulatory handbook, in the section" Regulation of Excavation at Historic Cemeteries [23-18-11 & 11.1]," states that "It shall be unlawful for any person to disturb, excavate, deposit fill, remove or destroy buried human remains... without first obtaining a permit from the city or town council to alter or remove said historic cemetery"; and

WHEREAS, RIHPHC regulations require that, when an application "has been made for alteration, construction, or excavation at a historic cemetery that is suspected to contain graves or archaeological burial sites" based on reliable historic information, the applicant "shall conduct an

archaeological investigation... that demonstrates that no graves or archaeological burial sites are affected;" and

WHEREAS, RIHPHC regulations require that, when such application has been made that the applicant shall conduct such archaeological investigation at his or her own expense and that the investigation shall be performed by "a qualified archaeologist working under a permit issued by [RIHPHC];" and

WHEREAS, RIHPHC regulations require that a report of such archaeological investigation "shall be submitted to the city or town council;" and

WHEREAS, Jeff Emidy, the Executive Director of RIHPHC, expressed in an August 16, 2023 letter to Patrick Hanner, Principal Planner for the city's Department of Planning & Economic Development, the Commission's concern with the development of the former Metacomet golf club property, specifically the "reasonable possibility" that the neighboring Native American Jones Pond site extends into the Metacomet project site; and

WHEREAS, J. Paul Loether, the former Executive Director of RIHPHC, expressed in a similar letter dated October 26, 2020, to Patrick Hanner, the same concern with the development of the Metacomet golf club property, for the same reason; and

WHEREAS, both current RIHPHC Executive Director Emidy and former Executive Director Loether "recommend that the City of East Providence call for an [archaeological] survey as part of its planning process and as an obligation under RIGL 23-18 et seq.,"

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the City Council of the City of East Providence calls upon the Mayor's Administration and the East Providence Department of Planning & Economic Development, in conjunction with the East Providence Waterfront Special Development District Commission to advise developer/applicant Marshall (a/k/a Metacomet) Properties that an archaeological survey performed by a qualified archaeologist at the applicant's expense, with a subsequent report to the City Council, is required by State law before any permit may be issued for further construction work on the Metacomet property site.
